

Ethical Statement by the Organising Committee and the Secretariat

The 9th International Purpureae Vestes Symposium takes place at a time of great instability, marked by ongoing conflicts and violations of Human Rights in the Euro-Mediterranean area which is the core area of interest of this series of Symposia. The Organising Committee and the Secretariat wish to acknowledge this, and to express their commitment to Human Rights and to the International Rule of Law.

It is worth noting that the Organising Committee assumed the commitment to organise the Symposium back in 2022, in Athens, long before the most recent escalation of violence in Gaza. Faced with the serious ethical challenges it poses, and out of respect for the History of these Symposia and its track record as a space for respectful dialogue around Textile Heritage, it has been decided not to impose any exclusion measures for this meeting.

The Organising Committee and the Secretariat wish, however, to make clear to all participants and other concerned parties that ethical standards were applied as part of the evaluation and vetting process leading to this event. With regard to presentations dealing with material from Israel, all efforts were made to ensure that none of the material presented hailed from archaeological or other Heritage sites in occupied Palestinian territories.

Other ethically challenging issues were also carefully considered. For example, for the material hailing from Northern Cyprus, an ethical statement was requested from the authors, who graciously provided it; this statement is appended to the corresponding abstract.

We would also like to explicitly state that the inclusion of colleagues with any institutional affiliation or from any nationality does not signify that the Organising Committee and the Secretariat agree with, support or sanction in any way the actions of their institutions, governments and ruling bodies.

We see ourselves as temporary custodians of a series of Symposia with a history that is much larger than ourselves, so we have chosen not to let our own political views and stances – no matter how deeply held they are – influence the organisation of this edition.
